Prayerful Prayers to Pray

In seminary, I was assigned to read the same book in four different classes; it's a book that has informed and challenged pastors for the last century. The book was *Power Through Prayer* by E.M. Bounds, and in it, Bounds states, "Nothing is clearer than that prayer has its only worth and significance in the great fact that God hears and answers prayer." If God did not hear us when we addressed him in prayer, then we'd just be talking to ourselves, and its power would be limited to that of a pep talk. Praise the Lord, that He hears our prayers; the God that created and sustains the universe by the power of His voice hears our prayers! Lifting up a prayer is not self-motivating; it is communicating with the sovereign King!

Not only are you communicating with God in prayer, but God is answering your prayers! We often hear someone say, "God did not answer my prayer," but the Scriptures are clear that God not only hears our prayers but He uses our prayers to accomplish His will and purposes! Revelation 8:1-5 clearly expresses that some of God's judgment at the end of time is in alignment with the prayers of the saints! We worship a God that both hears and answers our prayers, but church family this reality makes some prayers challenging to pray.

This month we are going to be praying some of the challenging prayers found in God's Word. We are going to pray like Peter and John for boldness to stand in faith and proclaim the gospel in the midst of opposition (Acts 4). We are going to unite with the prophet Jeremiah in lamenting over the brokenness and unrepentance around us, as we pray for God to break our heart (Jeremiah 8). We are going to pray, "Lord send me," in response to the call of God, to take the good news of redemption to those in darkness (Isaiah 6:8). We are going to ask the Lord to guide our lives by speaking to us in a powerful way (1 Samuel). Lastly, we are going to ask the Lord to search our hearts for anything that is contrary to His will, and to lead us to follow His will no matter the cost. Brothers and sisters, these are not easy prayers to bow the knee and pray. Are you willing to be sent with the gospel to the unreached people groups? Does your heart desire to be searched and broken? Do you want to be guided by the Lord? All of these prayers require you to truly give every aspect of your life to the King of kings. Are you willing to bow the knee?

HOW TO USE THIS STUDY

LIFE GROUP STUDY

Your Life Group should be a community of believers discussing and studying the scriptures together. Life Group is not lecture time, that occurs during the Sunday sermon. During Life Group, you will break down the weekly Scripture passage and seek to apply it specifically to your life. In addition to studying the word, we want to ask you to keep each other accountable, pray for one another, and encourage each other to remain obedient to God's word!

Many of you already read through the guide and answer the questions before Life Group. I want to encourage more of you to try this method. Answering the questions beforehand makes it easier for you to have a discussion and gives you time to process the encouragement and conviction you felt in response to the passage of Scripture! Then in Life Group, you can share that with others!

Interactive Learning Guide:

Prayer Stations & Psalm 139:23-24

NOVEMBER: WEEK 1

SERIES CONNECTION:

This month we are studying powerful yet challenging prayers to pray, and to start our life group study of these passages, we wanted to do something a little different. We want to give you an opportunity to pray each of these five prayers as a group. To accomplish this, we are going to have prayer stations set up around our church campus. Your group will meet in your classroom, and then follow a rotation schedule that will be sent to the Life Group leaders the week prior. Then you will finish in your classroom with some questions on Psalm 139:23-24.

PRAYER STATIONS: (7 MINS EACH)

Each of the prayer stations will have the Scripture passage, prayer prompts, and an activity that aligns with the prayer prompts.

Station 1: Lord Search My Heart

Read: Psalm 139:23-24

Activity: Write a personal prayer to the Lord on an index card and hang it on the string.

Prayer Prompts:

1. Express to the Lord the vastness of His knowledge of your life, and praise Him!
2. Ask the Lord to search you for lifestyle choices that are contrary to His will.
3. Ask your father to give you the strength to give up anything offensive.

Station 2: Lord Break My Heart

Read: Jeremiah 8:1-7

Activity: Jesus' body was broken for your repentance; nail a current struggle you are justifying or ignoring that needs to be fully submitted to Jesus.

Prayer Prompts:

1. Praise God for providing a way of Redemption through the cross of Jesus!
2. Ask the Lord to break your heart for the sin in your own life.
3. Pray that our government leaders would repent of their sins in regard to promoting abortion and injustice.
4. Pray that our friends and family would repent and turn to Jesus.

Station 3: Lord Speak to Me

Read: 1 Samuel 3:10-21

Activity: Write a Scripture that has spoken to you in a hard time on the wall.

Prayer Prompts:

1. Ask the Lord to speak to you through His Word!
2. Pray that you would have the same response as Samuel to the Lord, "Speak, for your servant is listening."
3. Pray that when the Holy Spirit, through the Word of God, guides and convicts you that you will surrender your control.

Station 4: Lord Send Me

Read: Isaiah 6:1-10

Activity: IMB unreached people group statistics. Follow the instructions.

Prayer Prompts:

1. Praise God for his Holiness, for He is Holy, Holy, Holy!
2. Pray that God would raise up laborers to go into the harvest. That people would give up the comforts of America to go and proclaim the gospel in unreached or barely reached groups. Pick an unreached group to pray for specifically.
3. Ask the Lord to send you if it's His will for you to go with the gospel.

Station 5: Lord Make Me Bold

Read: Acts 4:13-31

Activity: Where has the Lord called you to be bold? Mark on Map of Wake County.

Prayer Prompts:

1. Praise God for giving someone the boldness to share the gospel with you.
2. Ask God to give you the boldness to proclaim the gospel among your friends and family members.
3. Ask God to give you the boldness to share the gospel, even if it means consequences from an employer or the government.

Let me be clear, we are not to be rebellious or trouble-seeking, but when asked or given the opportunity, we must speak of what we have seen and heard concerning Jesus, no matter the consequence.

GROUP DISCUSSION

REREAD PSALM 139:23-24

“Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my concerns. See if there is any offensive way in me; lead me in the everlasting way.”

QUESTIONS

1. Compare verses 23-24 with verses 1-2 of Psalm 139. Why do think David asked God to search him, given his statement in verses 1-2?
2. What is the extent of God’s knowledge of you? I know it’s impossible to express in words but make an effort.
3. How does it make you feel to know that God knows everything about you?
4. What does David mean when he says, “test me Lord?”

BED TIME

Prayer & Scripture Memory

Interactive Learning Guide:

Jeremiah 8

NOVEMBER: WEEK 2

MAIN IDEA OF THE TEXT:

Brokenness over sin leads to a longing for restoration with God.

SERIES CONNECTION:

My mother loved her children like crazy. She was empathy personified. If one of her children was hurting, she cried with more tears than they did. If something wonderful happened to one of her children, Mom's smile nearly touched each of her ears! I'll never forget calling mom to tell her that someone I was dating had called off the relationship. I was sad and even crying. Mom was bawling. By the end of the phone call I was trying to console her. That was a mother's love.

Jeremiah was a prophet in Judah in the years before and during the exile of Judah to Babylon. God's people had rebelled against God and taken up the worship of false gods. God called them to repentance through His prophet Jeremiah, yet they would not repent. As the judgment of God for their sin drew closer, Jeremiah knew that it would be hopeless for God's people if they didn't repent, and he watched them continue down the path of rebellion. It was heartbreaking to God, and also to Jeremiah. Jeremiah hurt over God's people more than they hurt for themselves. Today's focal passage is at the end of Jeremiah 8, a chapter in which God describes the coming judgment of Judah. This focal passage reveals a prayerful response of a man who loved God and loved God's people... a man who was broken over that which broke the heart of God.

This focal passage is a snapshot of the three voices at once: Jeremiah's, God's, and the peoples of Judah.

READ JEREMIAH 8:18-22 (CSB)

18 My joy has flown away; grief has settled on me. My heart is sick.

19 Listen—the cry of my dear people from a faraway land, “Is the Lord no longer in Zion, her King not within her?” Why have they angered me with their carved images, with their worthless foreign idols? 20 Harvest has passed, summer has ended, but we have not been saved. 21 I am broken by the brokenness of my dear people. I mourn; horror has taken hold of me. 22 Is there no balm in Gilead? Is there no physician there? So why has the healing of my dear people not come about?

GROUP DISCUSSION

Take a moment to write down your initial observations and summarize the text.

1. This passage includes a lament of Jeremiah over the plight of the people of Judah as a result of their terrible, sinful actions. Look back at Jeremiah 7:27-31 and identify the actions of Judah that would lead to her destruction. List them here:
2. God is holy. The severity of His judgment toward sin, as harsh as it may seem to us, reveals the utter holiness of His character which is greater than we can ever comprehend. According to Jeremiah 7:32-8:17, what would be the consequences for Judah's sin?
3. How does the severity of God's judgment against the sin of His people reflect the magnitude of His grace in the sacrifice of Jesus who bore our sin?

4. Which of the verses of Jeremiah 8:18-22 are the voice of Jeremiah? Which of the verses are the voice of the people of Judah? Which of the verses are the voice of God?

5. What is the nature of Jeremiah's response to Judah's plight?

6. Why does Jeremiah say in verse 21 "I am broken by the brokenness of my dear people?"

There are two different uses of "broken" in this verse. The people of Judah are broken by their sin and will experience the wrath of God rather than the blessings of God that could have been known by their obedience. So their lives and their futures are marked by brokenness. Jeremiah is broken over the rebelliousness of his people, God's people, who are hardened against God. Jeremiah's heart is also broken over the coming judgment that lies before Judah. Jeremiah loves God and loves God's people, and it's more than he can bear alone to see them reject God.

Maybe you as well have been broken over someone else's brokenness. We can hurt greatly over the hurt others bring upon themselves, whether it's our children, friends, lost people, or even wayward Christians. If you're in a position of Christian leadership, you may relate to Jeremiah's grief when you see those that profess Christ live as lost people. Charles Spurgeon said "A preacher whom God sends will often feel more care for the souls of men than men feel for themselves or their own salvation."

7. One way to describe being broken or brokenhearted is “grieving.” Does God grieve? If so, what causes God to grieve?

In the New Testament, Paul wrote to the Ephesians “And don’t grieve God’s Holy Spirit. You were sealed by him for the day of redemption (Ephesians 4:30).” This was written to Christians who were saved, and yet Paul exhorted them to live differently, not with a lifestyle of sin, but a lifestyle of kindness, compassion, and a spirit of forgiveness.” Paul expresses that our disobedience to God causes His Spirit to grieve.

8. As God’s heart is broken over the sin of His people, Jeremiah’s heart is also broken over the sin of God’s people. What would be a biblical response to being broken over that which breaks God’s heart?

A biblical response would be to pursue restoration to a right relationship. How? Through confession (agreeing with God) and repentance (a mind change about sin that leads to a change of direction in living), both of which are acts of faith that lead to obedience.

9. What does this passage prompt you to pray for your own life, and in harmony with your praying, what does this passage prompt you to do?

Memory Verse: "Even storks in the sky know their seasons. Turtledoves, swallows, and cranes are aware of their migration, but my people do not know the requirements of the Lord." - Jeremiah 8:7

Pray that our friends and family would repent and turn to Jesus.

DRIVE TIME

Discussion / Check-In

What would it have looked like for the people of Israel to repent during Jeremiah's day? What does it look like for us to repent?

Emphasize humbling yourself before God and seeking forgiveness, then turning away from that sinful action.

DINNER TIME

Family Devotion

Opening Question:

Why would we want to pray for a broken heart?

Read Jeremiah 8:4-6 Together.

"You are to say to them: This is what the Lord says: Do people fall and not get up again? If they turn away, do they not return? Why have these people turned away? Why is Jerusalem always turning away? They take hold of deceit; they refuse to return. 6 I have paid careful attention. They do not speak what is right. No one regrets his evil, asking, 'What have I done?' Everyone has stayed his course like a horse rushing into battle. How does knowing Jesus is returning give you hope? Does it affect the way you live?"

When you do something that God says is wrong, how do you feel? Do you feel broken?

1 Samuel 3

NOVEMBER: WEEK 3

MAIN IDEA OF THE TEXT:

God speaks to the one who is willing to draw close to Him in faithful obedience.

SERIES CONNECTION:

Another challenging prayer to pray on a consistent basis is, "Lord speak to me." This prayer is challenging because of the many different barriers Satan uses to hinder our prayer lives. One barrier to our praying is our inexperience in being able to know and recognize when God is speaking. Another barrier is simply due to the busyness of our lives, we do not take the time to hear a word from the Lord. Finally, there is the reality of sin in our lives that hinders our ability to hear and understand when the Lord does speak. Today in our discussion from 1 Samuel 3:1-21 we can learn how to overcome the barriers to praying this simple, but powerful prayer, "Lord speak to me".

READ 1 SAMUEL 3:1-21 (CSB)

1 The boy Samuel served the Lord in Eli's presence. In those days the word of the Lord was rare and prophetic visions were not widespread. 2 One day Eli, whose eyesight was failing, was lying in his usual place. 3 Before the lamp of God had gone out, Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was located. 4 Then the Lord called Samuel, and he answered, "Here I am." 5 He ran to Eli and said, "Here I am; you called me." "I didn't call," Eli replied. "Go back and lie down." So he went and lay down. 6 Once again the Lord called, "Samuel!" Samuel got up, went to Eli, and said, "Here I am; you called me." "I didn't call, my son," he replied. "Go back and lie down." 7 Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, because the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. 8 Once again, for the third time, the Lord called Samuel. He got up, went to Eli, and said, "Here I am; you called me." Then Eli understood that the Lord was calling the boy. 9 He told Samuel, "Go and lie down. If he calls you, say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.'" So Samuel went and lay down in his place. 10 The Lord came, stood there, and called as before, "Samuel, Samuel!" Samuel responded, "Speak, for your servant is listening." 11 The Lord said to Samuel, "I am about to do something in Israel that will cause everyone who hears about it to shudder. 12 On that day I will carry out against Eli everything I said about his family, from beginning to end. 13 I told him that I am going to judge his family forever because of the iniquity he knows about: his sons are cursing God, and he has not stopped them. 14 Therefore, I have sworn to Eli's family: The iniquity of Eli's family will never be wiped out by either sacrifice or offering." 15 Samuel lay down until the morning; then he opened the doors of the Lord's house. He was afraid to tell Eli the vision, 16 but Eli called him and said, "Samuel, my son." "Here I am," answered Samuel. 17 "What was the message he gave you?" Eli asked. "Don't hide it from me. May God punish you and do so severely if you hide anything from me that he told you." 18 So Samuel told him everything and did not hide anything from him. Eli responded, "He is the Lord. Let him do what he thinks is good." 19 Samuel grew. The Lord was with him, and he fulfilled everything Samuel prophesied. 20 All Israel from Dan to Beer-sheba knew that Samuel was a confirmed prophet of the Lord. 21 The Lord continued to appear in Shiloh, because there he revealed himself to Samuel by his word.

GROUP DISCUSSION

1. Take a moment to write down your initial observations and summarize the text.

2. Read 1 Samuel 2:27-36. Why do you think that the Lord called out to Samuel the boy instead of Eli the priest?

3. How did Samuel's surroundings help him hear from God?

4. How does Samuel's response to the voice of God reveal his surrender to the will of God?

5. What specific message did the Lord give to Samuel?
6. What is your greatest fear in praying, "Lord speak to me"?
7. Often times it is difficult for us to hear and understand when God is speaking to us. If you absolutely commit to hear from God on a daily basis, what distractions would you need to limit or eliminate all together?
8. When you pray, "Lord speak to me," how can you expect him to answer you? Of the different ways He speaks today, what is the most dependable?
9. What does this passage influence you to do? Be specific.
10. Will you commit to praying every day this week, "Lord speak to me"? Will you commit to responding in obedience to what it is the Lord ask of you?

The challenging prayer is, Lord, speak to me. How has the Lord spoken to us? How does that compare to how He spoke to Samuel?

SUNDAY, NOV. 19TH

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Interactive Learning Guide:

Isaiah 6:1-8

NOVEMBER: WEEK 4

MAIN IDEA OF THE TEXT:

When we fully see God for who He is, it will lead to a sense of awe and humility that leads to understand our brokenness before a holy God. The wonderful news of God's redemption is that HE is the one who cleanses us and makes us holy. God calls us to share this news as we trust in Him for Salvation.

SERIES CONNECTION:

One of the many challenging prayers to pray is "Here I am, send me". Let's be honest, we often have the attitude of Jonah: "Here I am Lord, I won't go there." Or Moses: "Here I am Lord, send someone else." God is calling each of us to Himself. When we understand that God alone has removed our sin, our response should be that of a thankful, forgiven sinner. Much like the prophet Isaiah, "Here I am Lord, send me. Lord I am available, please use me."

READ ISAIAH 6:1-8 (CSB)

1 In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord seated on a high and lofty throne, and the hem of his robe filled the temple. 2 Seraphim were standing above him; they each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. 3 And one called to another: Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of Armies; his glory fills the whole earth. 4 The foundations of the doorways shook at the sound of their voices, and the temple was filled with smoke. 5 Then I said: Woe is me for I am ruined because I am a man of unclean lips and live among a people of unclean lips, and because my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of Armies. 6 Then one of the seraphim flew to me, and in his hand was a glowing coal that he had taken from the altar with tongs. 7 He touched my mouth with it and said: Now that this has touched your lips, your iniquity is removed and your sin is atoned for. 8 Then I heard the voice of the Lord asking: Who will I send? Who will go for us? I said: Here I am. Send me.

QUESTIONS

1. Take a moment to write down your initial observations and summarize the text.

GROUP DISCUSSION

2. Sunday's message was about praying the prayer of availability, here am I Lord send me. Often times we speak of God's answer to this prayer as His call to an individual for a specific task. What are some examples from Scripture of those who excused or ignore God's call to them?

3. In your own words, how you would describe Isaiah's experience of being in the presences of the Lord in verses 1-4?

4. Why did the seraphim (angels) who are sinless, cover their faces before the Lord?

5. What does holy mean? Why did the seraphim say three times the Lord is holy? Why is the attribute of holiness important for us to fully understand?

6. Is there any significance to the tongue being singled out in this passage?

7. How was Isaiah able to move from “Woe is me for I am ruined” in verse 5, to “Here I am, send me” in verse 8?

8. As a follower of Christ, am I as aware of my own sinfulness as I should be? What am I in danger of, if I fail to fully be aware of my personal sinfulness and do not properly confess my sin?

9. Just like Isaiah was sent out with important news, we have also been sent out to proclaim important news. How does being sent look like for you?

10. How does this text prompt me to pray?

Discussion / Check-In

"5 Then I said: Woe is me for I am ruined because I am a man of unclean lips and live among a people of unclean lips, and because my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of Armies. Then one of the seraphim flew to me, and in his hand was a glowing coal that he had taken from the altar with tongs. He touched my mouth with it and said: Now that this has touched your lips, your iniquity is removed and your sin is atoned for." - Isaiah 6:5-6
